Summary

Main Entry: Carver School of Missions and Social Work Collection

Date Span: 1928 – 1961

Abstract: The Carver School of Missions and Social Work opened in 1907 in Louisville, Kentucky to train women for Christian ministry and mission work. Many of the women served as missionaries of the Home and Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. The collection focuses on the 1930s to the 1960s and contains such items as bulletins, catalogues, programs, and a copy of the school's history.

Historical Sketch

The Carver School of Missions and Social Work opened in 1907, as the Woman's Missionary Union Training School for Christian Workers in Louisville, Kentucky, to train women for Christian ministry and mission work. The school trained many women who would serve as missionaries of the Home and Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. The school was operated by the Woman's Missionary Union of the Southern Baptist Convention.

The named was changed in 1953 to better describe its enlarged program. In 1956, control of the school was assumed by the Southern Baptist Convention and Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. In 1963, in order to obtain accreditation, it merged with the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. In 1998, Southern Seminary sold the school to Campbellsville University and returned the financial assets of the school to the Woman's Missionary Union.

Scope and Content Note

The collection is contained in two document boxes (1 linear ft. of material) and is arranged in alphabetical order by folder title. The collection focuses on the period from the 1930's to the 1950's. It includes Alumni bulletins, catalogues, clippings, programs to

various events, a scrapbook, a study completed by Booz, Allen and Hamilton, and a manuscript copy of the history of the school by Carrie Littlejohn. Most of the collection was acquired from the Carver School as a gift in 1961.
